







Hip-Hop Diaspora: Archiving and Celebrating 50 Years of the Culture

From Toronto to Havana, to London and Stockholm, we will consider the relationships between hip-hop street culture practices, archiving and preservation.

Brief Project Description

This November 9-11, 2023, we launch UofT's Hip-Hop Diaspora (HHD). This year's theme is Archiving and Celebrating 50 Years of the Culture. HHD will be a transdisciplinary, collaborative, multi-campus symposia series project aiming to disseminate and mobilize emerging knowledge production practices at the intersection of hip-hop culture and the digital humanities. From Toronto to Havana, to London and Stockholm, thinking about the relation between hip-hop culture and the digital humanities, we will examine how hip-hop street culture practices, education, and innovations ushered the many affordances attributed to the digital humanities. Explorations at the said intersection should enable new ways to define and expand human/technology relations—but also decolonial, horizontal and study-up approaches to historicizing, sharing knowledge and designing research.

Following the Jackman Humanities Institute's 2023-2024 Program for the Arts' Absence theme UofT' 2023 Hip-Hop Diaspora will celebrate hip-hop culture's 50th anniversary by anchoring the following questions: 'What spiritual, self-reflexive, technological innovations and political practices inform hip-hop knowledge production endeavours beyond the US? 'How might these elements be preserved in hip-hop archiving efforts?'

Hip-Hop Diaspora will partner with the Afrosonic Innovation Lab, Northside Hip Hop Archive, the Hip-Hop Education Center, and Habana Hip-Hop this year. At the University of Toronto (UofT), our event is supported by a 2023-24 Program for the Arts Fellowship of the Jackman Humanities Institute. Other generous cash and in-kind support contributors are the Faculty of Music, the Center for Caribbean Studies, the Critical Digital Humanities Initiative and the Department of Arts, Culture and Media of the University of Toronto, Scarborough.
